ULCERATIVE COLITIS FLARE UPS VS. REMISSION

Letter 1:

I was taking three Asacol of 400mg each daily. I've been in remission since 2009 up until now. I quit taking Asacol all together at that time. About three months later and having changed doctors, I was told not to quit Asacol as it acts as a protective drug to remain in remission. I chose at that time to take one 400mg tab daily, and have done so since, without any problem, and remain in remission. However, you know what's one person's cure for UC isn't for another.

Letter 2:

It's interesting to know how GI doctors differ on what is "right" to do. My GI wants to take me off it completely then I'll mention just staying on just one pill or going back to one or three a day if I start to flare after being off. Thank you again!

Letter 3:

When I was in a long remission, I was able to taper down on Colazal from the maximum dose. I am getting into remission now with Cimzia and will probably start tapering Apriso after my next GI appointment next month.

Hello, I had a GI appointment and the doctor thinks that since 6mp is working so well, it did the trick and I am getting myself back in remission. I can now try tapering off Asacol. I'm on nine pills a day so will go to six pills a day for a few months then three pills a day for another few months.

Has anyone tried this and NOT gone into a flare? I really don't need another flare again....

CONSTIPATION

HI,

I grew up with IBS and in my early 40s was diagnosed with UC. I haven't dealt with constipation since the diagnosis. I'm on 2000mg of Pentasa daily. I don't have any

active UC. These past couple weeks though I've dealt with constipation and it's been so severe, that it has doubled me over in pain. I've used OTC pills and when it was horrible, took a glass of prune juice that had me going to the bathroom the rest of the night. Not to mention gas buildup until it finally got completely out of my system. I'm starting to wonder if the Pentasa dose is too high, as I was on 500mg 3x daily until a few years back, when we switched to one dose per day. The it started that there was far more success with 2000mg daily, then with 1500mg, so my doctor went with that dose. I haven't had any issues until lately, which is why I'm thinking its the dose of Pentasa. Has anyone else dealt with this?

Answer:

Are you eating any fibre? It is critically important to get enough fibre in your diet. If you must use a laxative use a non-stimulant one like lactulose. Don't let it go too long. The Pentasa is keeping you symptom free.

IN REMEMBRANCE OF DATO JOHN DAVID CARDOSA

Dato John Cardosa passed away in the morning of October 6, 2011 due to lingering illness. He is survived by his wife and children.

The story of Dato John David Cardosa goes a long way as he has touched a lot of people's lives merely by the energy and passion in the way he has lived life and witnessing to it.

He reveals that he had made a vow in the year 1972 when he was given a death

sentence by his doctors then. It was then that he made a vow to serve his fellowmen for as long as he is able to do. It inspires everyone to know that he has been faithful in his promise to our Lord and Master who have actually gifted him with 38 years more of a well lived life.

When Dato John was still alive, he would say "every additional day I am alive is a bonus, it is the reason for me to serve Him through my fellow ostomates and cancer survivors."

Dato John was a long time AOA President for 3 year term in his own right. In 1998, the then President Tahir of Malaysia, was unable to travel to IOA Executive Meeting due to illness. Dato John was deputized to attend in his stead. He was first elected as AOA President in his own right in 1999 and served for 3 years up to 2002 during the Manila AOA Conference. At the House of Delegates Meeting in Manila, Dato John proposed Dr. Harikesh Buch of Mumbai as the AOA President for the term of office 2002 to 2005, but Dr. Buch refused to accept this position unless Dato John remained on the AOA Council as Secretary and Treasurer. He had to agree to those terms and Dr. Buch, was elected

the AOA President, while John Cardosa served as Secretary and Treasurer of the AOA. In 2005, at the Bangkok AOA Conference, he was again voted in as President of the AOA. So in actual fact, Dato John has served for 3 terms.

He would have not served for these long if not for the charisma, the smile and the love he had

for people.

Rest in peace our dear friend Dato John David Cardosa.



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Davao Ostomy Association

An Australian, living with his Filipino wife and two children in Catalunan Grande Davao City, went to Australia for an operation [urostomy] to remove his cancerous bladder. On his return to the Philippines, he found there were two others in his area in similar situations [colostomy] but unable to afford their appliances. One of these was his neighbor of over three years, Mae. While he and his wife known her well, they had not known about her situation until then. After reading about the Australia Fund and their activities, he contacted them on their behalf of these people, to check the possibility of supplying at least some product.

On hearing about these two people, the Australia fund chairman, Mr. Gerald Barry decided he would do what he could on this occasion, although he would be unable to assist full time without a stoma association in Davao. He organized product through his resources and subsequently supplied a large quantity of appliances that would be able to assist what has now become three people for about three months. Appliances in the Philippines are relatively cheap but the cost is about the same as the daily wage of those that are lucky enough to have employment, and the unemployment in this area is very high. He also offered suggestions as to founding a stoma association in Davao so that donated appliances could continue to be supplied on an ongoing basis.



Estela Arnaiz had been using a home made

two piece product. Her flange was a plastic coffee lid with a hole, taped over her stoma and a plastic bag tapped to that. This in no way was effective in reducing the odor which was obvious to those that were near to her. Angela Diligencia did not use of a plastic coffee lid but also used plastic shopping bags directly tapped to side for most of her 22 years. Mae Manigos was only able to purchase small quantities of product and therefore she needed to keep cleaning and reusing the same appliance over and over again.

There was also a gentleman in the area that had recently received a colostomy, but unfortunately, he passed away shortly after his operation due to infections, possibly due to not having adequate appliances.

While the donated product has brought smiles to these three faces, the supplies will only last a few months. The suggestions of Mr. Gerald Barry's are now being implemented and they are now trying to organize a stoma association in Davao in order that the Australia Fund will be able to supply product to these and other needy people in Davao for a long time to come.

These three people would like to express, through this article, their overwhelming thanks to all that have assisted in getting this product to them, with a special thanks to Mr. Gerald Barry, the chairman of the Australia fund.

Ostomates in Focus

Mae Manigos has had a long run with her problems, it started in England in 2000 when she had a total hysterectomy due to an ovarian cyst and during the operation they found Cancer in her large bowl and gave her a reversible stoma. After 3 years of chemo then some radiation therapy she stopped all treatment and returned to the Philippines with her husband [she thought, to die]. In May 2006 they found more cancer in her small intestine and removed it to make her fifth operation for cancer. He husband died later that same year. Her doctor told her in August last year that she now has diabetes and she also may have cancer in her bladder, if it needs to be removed it will make her a dual ostomate. Since her English husband's death she has found it very hard with little income from her part time work. She has now left work due to illness and can not afford to purchase her necessary needs.

Our trip to Iran was a very pleasant surprise. Many people we know were worried that we were going and quoted negative stories to us. We had a wonderful time and no problems. Our visa was only for 7 days (I had missed reading this!), but our stay and airline ticket was scheduled for 10 days. So we had to to the Police and Immigration Office in Tehran to get an extension. There were paperworks involved and sitting around, but the extension was issued without any problem. Special thanks to Maryam for all her help.



We went to Tehran at the invitation of the Iranian Ostomy Society's President to take part in the 1st Asian South Pacific

Ostomy Association (ASPOA) Conference. The Iranian people were great, the conference was a super success, food was plenty and weather could not have been better, no rain. We met people we have known for years and others for the first time. All the people were very nice. The conference had many interesting topics and we attended most of them. i.e. Type of ostomy & their indications, Correct construction of an ostomy, Enterostomal care, Ostomy sitting & discharge planning, Complications of intestinal ostomy, Non surgical management of ostomy complications, Genetic in rectal cancer, Fecal diversion, Stoma & nutrition, The effect of ostomy on sexual relationship, Ostomy managing products & accessories in Iran, Rectum & colon irrigation, Urostomy & nephrostomy, Gastrostomy: indications & care, Surgeon & Enterostomal collaboration with ostomates, Welfare policies for ostomates, Techniques in sphincter preservation, Rectal cancer and ostomy, Surgical management of ostomy complications, Appendicostomy, Ostomy in paediatrics etc.



The idea for the Iranian Ostomy Society (charity) was formed in 2001 by Dr. Mohammad Vafai, veteran Iranian surgeon and current President of the Society. I started to help Iran with ostomy supplies two years later as no other country was able to help. It was not easy but I did have success. The society has an ostomy house that is out of this world. Three levels with an outside courtyard in back.

There is a basement where ostomy supplies are stored on shelves. I was able to recognize some of my writing on the boxes. I was honoured when they told me that the storage room will be named and dedicated to me. The street level floor is for ostomates to receive help. It has an office, a large comfortable sitting area and a room with two beds (divided by curtain) where a nurse provides help. Patients receive daily medical care and attention to their problems. Also, Ostomy bags are given out by the nurses of the Society. There are about 30,000+ Ostomy patients in Iran comprising of; 70% Colostomy 20% Ileostomy and 10% Urostomy – of which 3,500 are members of the Iranian Ostomy Society.

Each Society Member has a small picture glued into a large membership book. Color coding shows what type of ostomy and a black dot is added when the member is deceased. There is a huge filing cabinet with color coded files, one for each member. The house has lots of space and is a well organized operation. This house was donated by a very rich man who died. The Society is very grateful and lucky having such a beautiful house.

In the meantime, ostomates can act as visitors to help bridge this gap.

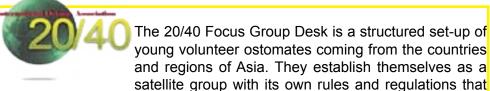
I thank the Friends of Ostomates

I made an early registration and did some stretches on my wheelchair. I made sure I had my dependable leather gloves on to have a good grip on my chair. Then it all started.

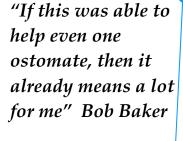
As much as I wanted to speed off and lead the pack, I gave the opportunity for others to go ahead.
